

The Archaeology of Jesuit Plantations and Jesuit-enslaved Ancestors, *Laura Masur*. Archaeological research has taken place at several sites within a system of Maryland plantations owned by Roman Catholic missionaries from the Society of Jesus (Jesuits). Recent excavations at St. Inigoes, Newtown, and Bohemia show complex changes made to these “lived in” historical landscapes through time, revealing details about the lives not only of Jesuit priests, but enslaved Africans and tenant farmers. These changes include the construction of chapels, manor houses, and slave quarters, but also the ways that communities remember and connect to important historical sites through archaeology.

Introduction to Land Patent and Deed Research, *Matthew McKnight*. Colonial land patents and deeds often provide important clues to the location of historic cultural resources. In Maryland, the vast majority of these primary source documents are available online. This workshop will provide a brief overview of how to conduct land patent and deed research from the comfort of home. Links to free tools and resources will be provided, as will an overview of the basic process for plotting land grants in GIS.

Flintknapping & Lithic Identification, *Nate Salzman and Zachary Singer*. Have you ever wanted to learn how the basic tools of daily life were made in pre-contact North America? In this workshop you will learn flintknapping techniques used to create chipped stone tools. Participants can make their own stone tool to bring home. Methods for analyzing stone tools and chipping debris to gain better insight into past lifeways will also be explored.


A Virtual Tour of Mallows Bay-Potomac River National Marine Sanctuary, *Sammy Orlando and Megan Ossmann of NOAA*. Paddle among the Ghost Fleet of Mallows Bay through the wonders of virtual reality. This 4 minute adventure uses "Google Street view" cameras at and above the waterline, as well as VR headsets to provide stunning imagery of these historic assets and their surrounding ecology. This is your chance to get immersed in Mallows Bay! NOTE: VR Sessions will run at 10 minute intervals from 11 AM to 3:30 PM. Two participants will be allowed per 10 min. time slot. Post Colonial Earthenware Identification, *Patricia Samford*. This workshop presentation will cover the basics of how to identify and date the most commonly found late 18th- and 19th-century refined earthenwares. Types to be covered include edged, painted, printed, and dipped earthenwares. Workshop participants will receive a full-color booklet covering identification of a full range of post-colonial ceramics. Zooarch 101: Basic Faunal Analysis, *Valerie M.J. Hall*. Animal bones are frequently found on archaeological sites in Maryland, but they are not always valued for the information they can provide beyond diet and subsistence. However, faunal material also can reveal information about past environments, changing landscapes and communities, and human-animal relationships. In this hands-on workshop, we will briefly discuss recent developments and new methods being used in zooarchaeology to explore the full potential of archaeofaunal remains. Finally, participants will work with bones and learn basic identification techniques for common species found on sites in the Chesapeake region.

CAT SESSION — Basic Laboratory Procedures, Parts I and II, *Rebecca Morehouse*. There is life beyond the field! This workshop will provide Certified Archeological Technician (CAT)* candidates with instruction on artifact handling, washing, labeling, and packaging, including an overview of archival packaging materials. CAT candidates will also receive an overview of the use of x-radiography in artifact identification and documentation. CAT candidates seeking credit for their program must attend both sessions; limit 20 each session. Please sign up at the Workshop Registration Desk.
